Submission to Authorities

We continue to connect with our theme this year. For the month of March the theme was "The Foreman (Respect)". The 3rd and 8th graders lead us through a wonderful chapel dealing with respect. Our verse for the month was: Romans 13:1 – "Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God."

Living in society and a community means living under authority. Sometimes we appreciate that authority and sometimes we do not. Sometimes it is comforting knowing there is someone or some entity overseeing our welfare and sometimes those same entities can seem oppressive and even ridiculous.

We have a great team working here at OCCS. That really came through in the preparation work and the site visits themselves. Our kitchen staff does a fantastic job feeding our children and making delicious, nutritious food. Our entire school staff works very hard to provide an excellent, strong education for our students.

It was exciting to hear to positive comments from the accreditation team. They saw and experienced the positive, Christ-filled atmosphere at our school. We always knew that to be the case, but it was encouraging to hear that from an outside entity.

Being a part of OCCS is a joy that is seen and felt by our students, parents, staff, board, community, and evaluation authorities. Thank you for being a part of that atmosphere. Thank you for your support as we finish this school year strong.


